

HUMANITARIAN PROGRAMME IN COX'S BAZAR

ACTIVITY REPORT
11 April 2018

BRAC is delivering lifesaving services from Ukhia down to Teknaf in Cox's Bazar. We are serving forcibly displaced Myanmar nationals as well as host communities in the following major areas.

HEALTH AND NUTRITION



- **1,270,200+** patients received primary health care (PHC) services through 10 PHC centres & 50 satellite clinics
- **1,053** babies delivered
- **47,697** ante and post natal check ups have been conducted
- **288,000+** fever cases treated
- **126,790** cases with acute watery diarrhoea treated
- **29,500+** people tested for tuberculosis (TB). 614 patients that were diagnosed with TB are being treated
- **443** people tested for HIV and 6 diagnosed as HIV positive
- **34,000+** people tested for malaria and 7 malaria cases confirmed
- **28,000+** adolescents, pregnant and lactating mothers received iron and folic acid tablets
- **4,000+** moderate acute malnutrition children received supplementary food
- **51,000+** children (< 5 years) received nutrition supplement.

PROTECTION



- **215** child friendly spaces established
- **47,000+** children are receiving recreational support
- **50** community-based protection committees formed
- **9** information points, two women friendly spaces and four community centres are functioning.

WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE



- **13,900+** latrines providing access to sanitation for **550,000+** people
- **20** fecal sludge management units have been constructed.
- **17,000+** latrines de-sludged and **2500+** latrines decommissioned
- **1,318** shallow tube wells & **213** deep tube wells installed for **440,000+** people's access to safe drinking water
- **4,500+** bathing cubicles built
- **72,900+** hygiene sessions conducted
- **3,500+** hand washing stations built
- **32,500+** sanitary napkins distributed
- **71,500+** water purification tablets distributed
- **47,000+** alum (Fitkiri) distributed
- **48** dumping stations built
- **7,056** waste bins have been set up in the settlements.

EDUCATION



- **300** learning centres established
- **24,108** students have access to learning centers
- **500** teachers have been assigned to guide the students
- **197** women received training on tailoring from women friendly spaces and community centres
- **98,300+** households visited by community volunteers to disseminate lifesaving messages on WASH, sanitation, nutrition and protection.

DISASTER RISK REDUCTION



- **1,094** households have been relocated to safer places
- **9,424** vulnerable shelters identified in risky areas and
- **68** stairs, **11** bridges, **30** drains, **58** retaining walls have been constructed
- **90** bathing cubicles, three deep tube wells built
- **26** latrines built, **847** latrines decommissioned

SITE MANAGEMENT



- **19** CIC coordination meeting held
- **61** community meetings conducted
- **12** sector coordination meetings conducted
- **5** zonal coordination meetings conducted.

AGRICULTURE AND ENVIRONMENT



- **9,800+** trees have been planted in makeshift settlements
- **22,000+** trees have been planted in host communities
- **103,000+** households have received vegetable seeds both in the settlements and host community to boost their food security
- **59,800+** sacks of briquettes have been distributed for fuel source
- **848** solar lights have been distributed.

SHELTER AND NON-FOOD ITEMS



- **25,518+** shelters have been built
- **49,000+** tarpaulins distributed for building shelters
- **5,100+** shelter tool kits have been distributed
- **214,000+** blankets provided
- **256,000+** sets of clothes distributed, including warm clothes for children and elderly population
- **9,600+** families received kits with household items
- **400+** water containers have been distributed
- **6** community kitchens have been established to support 90 households.

1,600 BRAC staff are on the ground serving 600,000 people

Shelter materials, such as high-quality tarpaulins, floor mats, clothes for new born baby; fuel for stoves; water storage containers; and solar/flash lights.



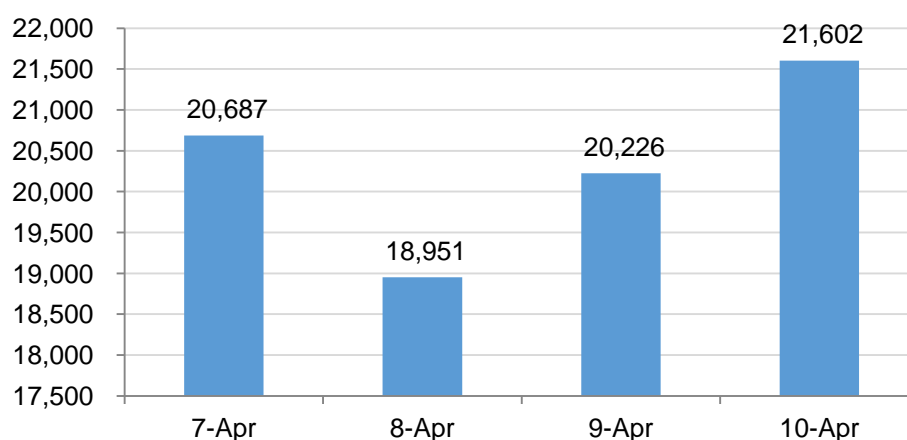
New initiatives for education:

BRAC has been successful in retaining Rohingya girls in the Learning Centres, 54.3% girls have been attending the Learning Centres.

BRAC's curriculum team has prepared teacher's guide for learning centers for the children of Rohingya community based on the draft Learning Competency Framework and Approach (LCFA), developed by the Education Cluster and closely supervised by UNICEF. The guide is focused on early learning, basic education and life skill education and good for three months teaching. The team is planning to start work to complete the guide for next nine months by the end of May, 2018.

BRAC has signed an agreement with Educate A Child (EAC), Qatar to establish 250 learning centre to ensure education for 17,500 children of Rohingya community living in camps.
